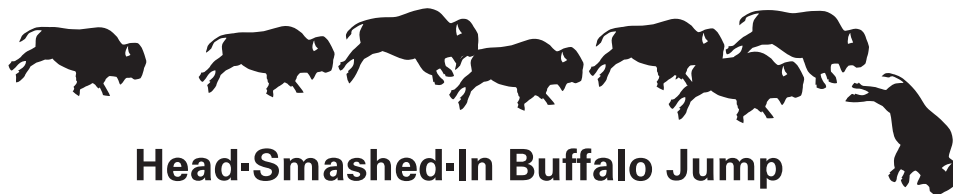

First Nations Cinema

Theatre capacity: 100 people. Pick up tickets at Info Desk.

March 4, 10 am - 4 pm

Hand Drum Making

Limited to 20 people. Fee \$25 for drum kit

Learn the ancient techniques of hand drum making. Discover the significance of the drum and why First Nations people refer to it as the "Heartbeat of Mother Earth". Participants build their very own hand drum from wood and rawhide.

March 11, 10 am - 4 pm

Moccasin Making and Beading

Limited to 20 people. Fee \$12 for moccasin kit

Learn to bead a basic Blackfoot bead design on buckskin. You will then learn the basics of moccasin construction by making your very own pair of beaded mini-moccasins. Our pre-cut kits become a great keepsake or decoration.

March 18, 1 pm - 4 pm

Pictures, Symbols and Stories

Limited to 40 people

Discover how native designs and pictures hold the key to unlocking stories from the past. Explore the symbols and stories that make up a Winter Count Robe. Learn the difference between a pictograph and a petroglyph. Listen to the rich oral tradition of the Elders.

March 25, 10 am - 4 pm

Traditional Native Foods: Preparation and Sampling

Limited to 20 people. Fee: \$10 per person.

Learn how to prepare authentic native pemmican. Sample Saskatoon berry soup. Our Native ancestors survived for thousands of winters on these foods. Also, learn to prepare a more contemporary native tradition – fry bread!

April 1, 1 pm - 4 pm

Hands-On Archaeology

Limited to 24 people

This workshop features hands-on screening of archaeological material scraped from the Lower Trail upgrade. Discover the evidence for theories about how the buffalo were processed after the kill below the jump. Learn some basics of archaeological field work.

April 15, 11 am - 3 pm

Hike to the Drive Lanes

Limited to 30 people. Must be physically fit. No young children.

Participants should bring lunch, water, windbreaker, and sturdy shoes.

Join our experienced Blackfoot Guide and our Provincial Site Archaeologist for this walk back in time to when the native people hunted the mighty herds of buffalo. Hike to the 5,700 year old drive lanes and other significant features.
